8TH APRU UNDERGRADUATE SUMMER PROGRAM



We are proud to be the host for the 8th APRU Undergraduate Summer Program in August. After successfully bidding to be the host for this year, intensive and detailed preparation and planning were articulated by International Student Centre as its main anchor in organising this program and with the help of various other departments and faculties in making this event a success.



The end result also shows the tremendous amount of teamwork and cooperation in the spirit of the university in providing the best service possible in ensuring that this program bears fruit for indeed all participants and achieving the intended the objectives in line with the theme presented for this year; "Developing Future Global Leaders of the Pacific Rim: The Different Facets of Leadership".



Various academic and non-academic content are drafted up and students are exposed to quality lectures from prominent speakers and industry leaders in the country which touch upon the challenges of today's inter-connected world as well as leadership challenges. The students are also being brought for various field trips as well as the homestay programmes for them to further immerse themselves in the local cultures and customs.









MUSEUM OF ASIAN ART

University of Malaya's Museum of Asian Art is an outstanding education-oriented museum. Located in the main campus of the university, it aims to promote Asian art among multicultural Malaysians. The Museum holds nearly 7,000 treasures, representing cultures throughout Asia, and spanning 4,000 years of Asian history. Featuring 1,500 squares feet of gallery space, the museum showcases the unique material aesthetic, and intellectual achievements of Asian art and culture, including Chinese pottery Hindu statuary, textiles from the Malay archipelago, and sacred masks of Orang Asli communities.

The collection of the Museum of Asian Art has a long history, having been built up over a period of almost 50 years. The first item on record is a bronze Buddha head from Chiengsen period (1400-1550 AD), Thailand, given to the museum by Kun Krassri Nimanamhasminda in 1954. This contribution marked the beginning of the University of Malaya Art Museum at that time based in the university's campus in Singapore. The Buddha head was thus acquired several years before the University of Malaya campus was established in Kuala Lumpur in 1962. At that time a section of the university library was used to display the artifacts. The museum's present home was built to accommodate the increasing new acquisition. In Jun 1980, the new building was built in the scenic area between the Faculty of Economics and the Law Faculty (currently occupied by the Business and accounting Faculty). Within its three floors of exhibition space, the museum represents three civilizations; the Indian, The Chinese and the Islamic (Malay culture).







Apart from that, the extensive water vessel (kendi) collection is the largest in the world with pieces dating from the 11th century A.D. The museum also houses many rare pieces such as the Sawankhalok pottery manhunt elephant figurines products in Thailand during 14th-15th century A.D. The valuable collections of stone carvings, copper items, Malays' weaponry among others are also on display as part of the university duties to provide our beloved students and country with a message- our ancestor passing a great civilization to us.









FIELD TRIPS

The field trip programs are catered during this period to the short term students especially for the APRU programs as well as our summer program for students from Asia University. The students are privileged to be able to experience the wonders of the historical city of Melaka, the skyscrapers of Kuala Lumpur, the beautiful night view of Putrajaya and its elegant buildings and structures, and also other interesting places.















ORIENTATION




It is with open hearts that we welcome new students for the new semester in September 2015. Airport pick-up service is provided for the students back to campus where they are all checking in to the dormitory, The 10th Residential College.



Students arrive in staggered times and orientation commences a day after that in which students are being given briefings and introduction to the general information on the university as well as the International Student Centre and the functions and services provided.



Various other briefings are also conducted with regards to the amenities we have on campus as well as the processes and matters that need to be done such as the matric cards, insurance, visa matters and also dormitory regulations. Campus tour is also held where the students are shown on the landmarks and other important buildings like the main library, faculties, administration building, post office, grocery shops and others.





The two-day orientation ends with a registration process and confirmation for visa and insurance as well as collecting their orientation pack which consists of a T-shirt, umbrella and a backpack.



The international full-time undergraduates are also being given a one week long orientation where they join the local students in all the orientation activities being prepared for them which include briefings and introduction to the university and its different centres, faculties and the facilities. Cultural and sports events are also held for the students and they have a productive week where it helps them to adapt and settle down quickly in preparation for their degree-seeking journey here.





OUTBOUND SUMMER PROGRAM TO TAIWAN



A total of 100 students were selected based on their academic achievement as well as co-curricular involvement in the university to join the Outbound Summer Program to Asia University, Taiwan.



The bilateral relations between the two institutions have been growing stronger each year where the reciprocal exchange of students every summer has been the catapult in elevating students' experience in both countries.





This August, the local students of UM were privileged to spend a month at Asia University where they had classes mainly in the fields of media studies. There was also a short film competition for the students where they were divided into teams and will then compete for the prizes during the closing finale.





They were also being brought for field trips around the city in Taichung and all expressed a pleasant experience.



SHORT TERM PROGRAM OTARU UNIVERSITY OF COMMERCE

The first arrangement for the summer program between University of Malaya and Otaru University of Commerce materialised in August 2014 where 12 students are spending three weeks in the university attending language classes as well as traditional dances and musical instruments. They are also accompanied by local students who also join them for their classes as well during the routines and performances for the learning of musical instruments and dances.











Among other activities being prepared for them are field trips to KL and Putrajaya and also homestay program at Kg Morten, Melaka. After seeing a successful summer program for the students, hopes are high for a further consolidation and elevation of efforts to improved and enhanced ties between the two institutions in bigger areas of cooperation and to retain similar programs in the future.
