No. 3913.—Importation into France and Algeria of Prohibited Goods of British Manufacture.—The following notice, issued in the Board of Trade Journal of the 19th October, 1916, is published for general information:

In agreement with the British Government, the French Government have set up at King's House, Kingsway, London, W.C., a French Customs Office (Bureau des Douanes Français de Londres) for the issue of licences for the importation into France and Algeria of goods of British production or manufacture which are included in the list of articles prohibited to be imported into those countries.

The following procedure has been laid down for the issue of such French import licences:

The application for a licence must be drawn up strictly in accordance with the annexed form, and must include a certificate to the effect that the place of production or manufacture of the goods is situated within the British Empire, that is to say, either in the United Kingdom or in a British Dominion, Colony or Protectorate. This certificate (which is to be inserted on the form of application itself) must be signed on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce of the district or town in which the merchant concerned carries on his business.

The form should then be forwarded by the applicant to the Assistant Secretary, Commercial Department, Board of Trade, Gwydyr House, Whitehall, London, S.W. The Department, after examining the application, will "viser" the same and forward it to the French Office in London. On receipt of this document the French Office will, unless there are reasons to the contrary, issue an import licence, which will be despatched in original to the actual consignee of the goods in France, and of which a copy will be sent to the exporter in this country.

Applicants for licences are specially recommended—

- (1) to give all the particulars required on the application form, in a legible manner;
- (2) to furnish a full description of the goods in both English and French—and, wherever possible, to indicate under which heading of the French Customs Tariff the goods fall \*;
- (3) to give the gross and net weight of the goods both in English units and in kilogrammes.

Failure to supply all the necessary particulars, or to comply with the recommendations given above, may involve delay in the issue of the import licence.

The French Office in London will not grant licences for the import into France or Algeria of diamonds, of the woods and metals prohibited to be imported into France and Algeria by the Decree of the 18th July, 1916, or of those parts or accessories of automobiles of which the importation is prohibited. In these cases applications for import licences should be made by the proposed consignee to the competent authorities in France or Algeria.

It should be clearly borne in mind that the arrangements notified above in no way affect the necessity of obtaining a British expart licence in respect of such of the articles covered by the French (and Algerian) import prohibitions as are prohibited to be exported from the United Kingdom to France or Algeria.

<sup>\*</sup> A translation of the French Customs Tariff was published by the Board of Trade in 1910 as a Parliamentary Return, and copies thereof may be obtained (from the Sale Agents specified on the cover of this Journal) at a cost of  $11\frac{1}{2}d$ , each, exclusive of postage. The reference number of the Return is Cd. 5,127.

<sup>†\*</sup>Neither the Board of Trade nor the French Customs Office in London propose to supply the actual forms to be used in making application for French import licences. Exporters desiring to obtain such licences should themselves supply the necessary forms of application, which will be accepted whether they are written, typed or printed so long as they are strictly in accordance with the model printed above. [It is understood, however, that the London Chamber of Commerce, and certain other Chambers, have had forms of application specially printed; firms in the London district desiring to obtain French import licences should obtain the necessary forms of application from the offices of the London Chamber of Commerce, Cannon Street, E.C.]

<sup>‡</sup> For the purpose of these import licences, goods are regarded as "British" when the place of production or manufacture is situated either in the United Kingdom or in a British Dominion, Colony, or Protectorate.

A list of the articles covered by the French (and Algerian) prohibitions of import, in respect of which import licences will be issued (for British goods) by the French Customs Office in London, is printed below for convenience of reference. Exporters who are in doubt as to whether goods which they desire to despatch are or are not covered by the prohibition should address an inquiry on the subject direct to the French Customs Office in London at the address given above.

<sup>†</sup> The term maroquinerie comprises the various articles manufactured by morocco-tanners, of which the principal part consists of leather (moroccoed or not), such as portfolios, blotting pads, hand bags, travelling bags (small or medium size), purses, albums, etc. "Hard" maroquinerie includes particularly articles in which the leather constitutes only an exterior covering stretched or fixed on a carcase of wood, cardboard, etc., and of which the value, compared with the weight, is relatively less than that of articles of "supple" maroquinerie. In the latter category are included wares of which the leather constitutes the principal part, and forms, in a sense, the body of the article.

No. 3914.—The United Kingdom Importation Restrictions.—It is hereby notified, with reference to Notification No. 3744, published in the Gazette on the 27th November, 1916, that by a Royal Proclamation, issued on the 5th December, 1916, the Royal Proclamation of the 16th November, 1916, is revoked, and the importation into the United Kingdom of the following articles is prohibited:

(a) Gold, manufactured or unmanufactured, including gold coins and articles consisting partly of or containing gold, except for the Bank of England;

(b) Silver manufactures, other than silver watches and silver watch cases;

(c) Jewellery of all descriptions.

THE CUSTOMS DUTIES ENACTMENTS, 1898 (PERAK, SELANGOR AND PAHANG), 1897 (NEGRI SEMBILAN).

No. 3915.—In exercise of the powers in them severally vested by section 3 of the Customs Duties Enactments, 1898 (Perak and Selangor) and 1897 (Negri Sembilan), and by section 4 of the Customs Duties Enactment, 1898 (Pahang), and with the approval of the Chief Secretary to Government, the Residents of Perak, Selangor, Negri Sembilan and Pahang, each in respect of the State whereof he is Resident, hereby cancel the import duties imposed, under the heading "Tobacco, etc.," by Notification No. 3903, published in the Gazette on the 11th December, 1916, and impose upon tobacco import duties at the rates hereunder specified:

Provided that

(a) no tobacco whereon import duty shall have been paid in any other State of the Federated Malay States shall be liable to duty under this notification unless brought into or conveyed through the State in contravention of the provisions of the rules, if any, from time to time made in that behalf by the Resident;

(b) no tobacco contained in passengers' luggage which is registered through, in accordance with the provisions of Rules under "The Railways Enactment, 1912," from a place outside the Federated Malay States to another place outside the Federated Malay States shall be liable

to duty under this notification;

(c) no tobacco in the possession of a person entering the State which is carried for his own personal consumption only and does not exceed \(\frac{1}{4}\) lb. in weight shall be liable to duty under this notification.
