FEDERATED MALAY STATES.

REPORT ON THE POSTS AND TELEGRAPHS DEPARTMENT FOR THE YEAR 1920.

1. The estimated number of letters, post-cards, packets and parcels posted and delivered during the year was 25,996,098, an increase of 2,850,446 on the figures for 1919. The estimated figures for each State will be found in the comparative statement in appendix I and from that statement it will be seen that there was a decrease in the number of post-cards dealt with.

REGISTERED ARTICLES.

2. The number of registered articles posted was 415,416 and 367,526 were delivered. The articles posted show an increase of 42,484 and those delivered an increase of 32,819 over the figures for 1919.

PARCELS

3. The parcels posted numbered 75,143 and those delivered 137,171. The parcels posted show an increase of 12,311 and those delivered and increase of 28,285 as compared with the figures for 1919.

CASH-ON-DELIVERY PACKETS.

- 4. Seven thousand seven hundred and thirteen packets bearing trade charges to the value of \$87,243 were posted, these figures showing an increase of 1,824 in number and \$23,883 in value. The packets received for delivery numbered 13,828 and bore trade charges to the value of \$168,565. The packets delivered show an increase of 2,582 in number and \$44,091 in trade charges as compared with 1919.
- 5. A Cash-on-Delivery service with the United Kingdom was brought into operation during the year. Two hundred and seventy-three articles to the value of £908 14s. were forwarded from the United Kingdom. The service is appreciated and there has been a steady increase in the number of parcels.

INSURANCE.

6. During the year 5,688 articles insured for \$1,075,747 were posted and 10,526 insured for \$2,282,833 were delivered. Articles posted show an increase of 2,694 in number and \$413,499 in value whilst those delivered show an increase of 4,663 in number and \$1,098,854 in value.

DEAD LETTERS.

- 7. In the Dead Letter Office 130,641 articles including 4,705 registered articles, were dealt with of which 79,343 were either returned to the sender or to the country of origin. The total number of articles dealt with includes 53,531 bearing letters taxed to the extent of \$4,516.
- 8. In the letters opened, local coin and notes to the amount of \$286.28, cheques and drafts to the face value of \$24,085.97, British postal orders to the value of £10 9s. 6d. and foreign currency, cheques and drafts to the estimated value of \$1,873 were found.
- 9. Fifty-two parcels were returned to the Dead Letter Office as "abandoned" and the contents have been sold or destroyed.
 - 10. Two hundred and sixty-four letters bearing no address were posted.

POSTAL ORDERS.

11. Forty-eight thousand and eight British postal orders, valued at \$316,641, were issued, and 1,796, valued at \$10,638 paid. These figures show a decrease of 19,910 in the number of orders issued and an increase of 44 in the number paid. The value of those issued decreased by \$175,455 and of those paid by \$7. The revenue from these orders after deducting \$510 lost in exchange amounted to \$3,291 as against a revenue of \$8,907 in 1919.

MONEY ORDERS.

- 12. Money Orders to the value of \$6,696,439 were issued and those paid amounted to \$3,620,879. As compared with 1919 the orders issued show a decrease of \$761,575 and those paid an increase of \$803,326. The number of those issued decreased by 19,930 but the number of those paid increased by 3,385.
- 13. Nine thousand six hundred and thirty-six telegraphic money orders amounting to \$882,526 were issued, being an increase of 619 in number and \$115,683 in value.
- 14. The revenue paid in as commission on money orders amounted to \$116,585, a decrease of \$55,028 as compared with 1919. The revenue includes the gain on exchange on money order transactions, which amounted to \$58,955.
- 15. Money order offices were opened at Mentakab and Ulu Yam, making the total number of money order offices 97.

- 16. In appendix II will be found the number and value of the money orders issued on the various countries, and of those received from them for payment in the Federated Malay States. In April and May, certain members of the Chetty Community attempted to take advantage of the money order system to remit large sums from India to this country by money orders with the intention of profiting by the difference between the Bank's rate and the Federated Malay States Post Office rate of exchange. This attempt was met by the Post Office fixing its rate of payment of money orders at approximately the Bank rate on the date of receipt in this country and the abuse promptly ceased.
- 17. Appendix III contains a comparative statement showing the value of the money orders issued and paid in the different State in 1919 and 1920.

SAVINGS BANK.

- 18. The number of depositors in the Savings Bank has increased by 1,412 during the year, 2,678 accounts being closed whilst 4,090 new accounts were opened. The total number of depositors on the 31st December was 11,682.
- 19. The amount to the credit of depositors has increased from \$994,807 to \$1,270,678. The average amount to the credit of each depositor has risen from \$96.87 to \$108.77. It was a record year for the Bank in all respects and had the abnormal increases in the first seven months continued at the same rate the balance would have shown an increase exceeding 50 per cent. During the final months of the year there was however an excess of withdrawals over deposits.
- 20. The amount of the deposits and withdrawals in each State will be found in appendix IV.
- 21. From the working account in appendix V it will be seen that there was a loss of \$3,899.
- 22. An investment account is given in appendix VI showing the sales and purchases during the year and the total investments on the 31st December. The sterling securities are shown at cost price.
- 23. Appendix VII contains a statement of assets and liabilities. The balance to the credit of the Savings Bank on the 31st December was \$78,542. Against this must, however, be set the depreciation in investments.

TELEGRAPHS AND TELEPHONES.

- 24. During the year 553,646 telegrams were despatched and 645,912 were received for delivery. As compared with the previous year there is an increase of 45,123 in the number despatched and 84,993 in the number delivered.
- 25. The revenue derived from telegraphs was \$320,499, of which \$226,977 are included in the stamp sales shown in appendix X.
- 26. The value of the telegrams sent free of charge for other Government departments was \$48,140.
- 27. The number of subscribers to the telephone exchanges on the 31st December was 1,633, an increase of 187. In addition there were 805 extension circuits, extension bells and private lines maintained by the department. These figures do not include the instruments maintained solely for the use of the police.
- 28. The revenue derived from telephones was \$268,224, this being an increase of \$25,736 on the figures for 1919.
- 29. A statement showing the length of telegraph and telephone lines, etc., in each of the years 1916—1920, inclusive, is given in appendix VIII.
- 30. On the 31st December, 1920, there were 2,504 miles of telegraph and telephone lines and 12,396 miles of overhead wire in the Federated Malay States, of which 9,600 miles were telephone wires. In addition there were $27\frac{1}{2}$ miles of underground cables, containing 2,511 miles of wire, single line. These figures include 1,145 miles of telephone wire maintained by this department for the police but do not include the wires maintained by the Railway Department for their own use. The Posts and Telegraphs Department also owns 121 miles of telegraph line and 365 miles of wire in Johore.
- 31. The erection of this department's through line of poles between Parit Buntar and Johore Bahru was completed and all the main telegraph lines transferred thereto. A direct telegraph line between Taiping and Penang was also completed.
- 32. A trunk telephone line between Taiping and Ipoh was erected and an additional trunk line between Klang and Kuala Selangor. A phantom circuit was constructed between Kuala Lumpur and Seremban by the superimposition of a telephone circuit on the telegraph lines in order to afford temporary additional trunk line accommodation.
- 33. All work during the year has been greatly hindered owing to the difficulty of obtaining delivery of stores and on the 31st December there were 550 applications for telephone connections outstanding.

- 34. The cost of maintenance was \$331,192 and a further sum of \$463,297 was spent on construction and reconstruction of which \$351,997 were spent on telephone work.
- 35. A continuous day and night telephone service at all exchanges was introduced in August.

POST OFFICES.

36. A post and telegraph office was opened at Ulu Yam and a post office at Mentakab in place of the allowance offices previously existing and an allowance office opened at Malim Nawar. There are now 98 post offices at which officers of the Posts and Telegraphs Department are employed and 38 places at which postal business is transacted by station masters and others.

REVENUE.

- 37. The net revenue collected by the department was \$1,064,742, a decrease of \$234,579. Stamps to the value of \$1,266,760 were sold and credited to State revenues.
- 38. In appendix IX the amounts are shown under the various heads of revenue. It will be seen that there was a very large decrease under the heading sale of stamps. This is due to the fact that there was a very large sale of stamps in December 1919 which were used for fiscal purposes but which were not debited against the Post Office revenue until January 1920.
- 39. In appendix X will be found the number of each denomination of stamps issued in 1919 and 1920.
- 40. The value of the services performed free of charge for other Government departments—such as transmission of correspondence and telegrams on official business and the maintenance of police telephone lines is estimated at \$132,000.

EXPENDITURE.

41. The expenditure amounted to \$1,818,290, annually recurrent expenditure being responsible for \$1,421,298 and special expenditure for \$396,992. The expenditure shows an increase of \$571,032 as compared with 1919, but is \$211,416 less than estimated. War allowances \$358,881 and acting allowances \$2,486 are not included in the above figures.

MISCELLANEOUS.

- 42. One hundred and thirty-six licences to collect letters for transmission to China were issued, 26 less than in 1919.
- 43. At certain post offices in districts where there is no dispensary or hospital 1,073 phials of quinine were distributed free of charge.
- 44. Import duties on tobacco, cigarettes, cigars, etc., imported by post were collected and the amount \$1,766, paid over to the Customs Department.
- 45. From the 1st January, a night service by express train between Kuala Lumpur and Penang was established and this enabled us to afford a much improved mail service.

STAFF.

- 46. Mr. T. A. Melville returned from leave on the 4th May and took up his appointment of Accountant, Mr. W. H. Green having acted up to the 4th May.
- 47. Mr. D. B. Evans, Assistant Telegraph Engineer, having been released from military duty, returned on the 2nd January and acted as Telegraph Engineer until the return from leave of Mr. C. G. Cadman on the 13th October.
- 48 Mr. H. J. Harris, Assistant Superintendent, returned from leave on the 6th July and Mr. V. C. Buckell, Assistant Telegraph Engineer on the 26th July.
- 49. Messrs. J. E. Cumming and G. H. N. Reay, Assistant Telegraph Engineers, left the department on transfer to the Railway Department and Mines Department.
- 50. Mr. T. Fitzgerald, Assistant Superintendent, proceeded on leave on the 26th February and has since been appointed Deputy Postmaster-General, British East Africa.
- 51. Mr J. C. Fuller, Assistant Telegraph Engineer, proceeded on leave on the 10th May and Mr. T. Lathan, Assistant Superintendent, on the 13th June.
- 52. Messrs. Gregson, Tremain, Galloway and Morice joined the department as Assistant Telegraph Engineers and Mr. R. G. Bennett as Stores Superintendent.
- 53. Considerable difficulty was again experienced in obtaining suitable men to fill vacancies in the subordinate staff.
