FEDERATED MALAY STATES.

REPORT ON THE TRADE AND CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT OF THE FEDERATED MALAY STATES FOR THE YEAR 1923.

PART I.-TRADE.

AGGREGATE.

The aggregate value of trade for the year including re-exports was \$286,189,187 compared with \$219,252,124 in 1922, an increase of 30 per cent.

The distribution per head of the population, ascertained at the last census to be 1,324,890, was \$216 as against \$165 in 1922.

Merchandise both imported and exported was valued at \$284,523,605.

The total value of imports including bullion and parcel post was \$89,088,237, an increase of \$10,265,888 or over 13 per cent. compared with the value of the import trade for 1922.

The total value of exports including bullion and parcel post was \$197,100,950.

Exports exceeded imports by \$108,012,713.

EXPORTS.

The total declared value of exports amounted to \$197,100,950 compared with \$140,429,775 for 1922 shewing an increase of 40 per cent. due mainly to the increased value of rubber and tin exported.

A comparative statement of the quantities and values of the principal articles of export is given in appendix B.

CLASS A .- LIVE ANIMALS, FOOD, DRINKS AND NARCOTICS.

The total value of this class exclusive of re-exports was \$2,191,332 as compared with \$1,848,808 in 1922, the increase being almost entirely due to the export of cattle, padi and preserved pineapples. There was no export of preserved pineapples in 1922 and previous years.

CLASS C.-MANUFACTURED ARTICLES.

The value of the manufactured goods produced in the country and exported was \$525,176 as compared with \$70,644 in 1922, the increases of note are : earthenware \$48,224, India rubber goods \$331,498 and mats and mattings \$119,294.

RE-EXPORTS.

The quantities of imported goods re-exported to other countries are shewn in the yearly Trade Return but are not of sufficient importance to warrant a detailed analysis.

The value of re-exports for 1923 was 5,796,558 as compared with 4,835,547 for 1922.

The import trade with the United Kingdom, other British Possessions and foreign countries has dropped from 15.86, 6.72 and 10.95 in 1922 to 9.78, 4.91 and 9.05 in 1923 respectively.

The export trade with Singapore has dropped from 40.01 in 1922 to 29.09 in 1923, whilst that with Malacca has increased from 3.29 in 1922 to 3.82 in 1923.

Direct export trade with United Kingdom, other British Possessions and foreign countries has increased from 8.56, .49 and 8.23 in 1922 to 13.61, .71 and 13.60 m 1923 respectively.

FOREIGN TRADE.

For statistical purposes trade with Singapore, Penang, Malacca and the Unfederated Malay States is treated as local trade whilst direct trade with other countries is regarded as foreign trade. Most of the trade of the Federated Malay States passes through Singapore and Penang, the direct foreign imports being only 23.74 per cent. and the direct foreign exports 27.92 per cent. of the total import and export trade respectively.

The total value of the direct trade with the United Kingdom was \$35,528,198 in 1923 compared with \$24,517,097 in 1922, an increase of 44 per cent.

The total value of the direct trade with foreign countries other than the United Kingdom and British Possessions was \$34,870,228 in 1923 compared with \$20,188,079 in 1922, the imports and exports have increased uniformly with all foreign countries.

The foreign trade of the Federated Malay States with all countries—other than parts of British Malaya—reached a total of \$75,882,223 in 1923 compared with \$50,687,565 in 1922.

The United Kingdom headed the list of foreign imports with a total of \$8.710,166 for 1923 as compared with \$12,498,544 for 1922, shewing a falling off over three million dollars, and headed the list of exports also with a total of \$26,818,032 for 1923 as compared with \$12,018,553 for 1922, shewing a rise of over fourteen million dollars.

The other main contributors to the import trade in order of value of trade were the United States of America, India, France, Germany, Italy and Siam, and for export trade the United States of America, Ceylon, Hongkong, India, Australia, Belgium, France, Germany, Holland, Italy and Japan.

PART II.—REVENUE.

The revenue collected by Customs, Excise and Chandu Departments amounted to \$30,811,501, an increase of \$8,594,431 as compared with the receipts for 1922, as shown by the following statement :

This collection exceeds the revenue for 1922 by just over 38¹/₂ per cent.

IMPORT DUTIES.

The total revenue accruing from Customs import duties was \$5,203,685, an increase of \$873,655 compared with 1922. All dutiable imports contributed to this increase, petroleum, spirits and matches particularly.

The total revenue accruing from Customs export duties was \$13,149,979, an increase of \$6,627,438, the increase being mainly due to rubber, tin and tin-ore.

WEIGHING AND HANDLING CHARGES.

'The amount collected under this heading amounted to \$75,034 as compared with \$96,839 in 1922, a decrease of \$23,805.

Appendices H and I refer to revenue collected by this department for the year 1923.

A general return of revenue and expenditure, Trade and Preventive operations of the Trade and Customs Department will be found in appendix O.

F.M.S. COLLECTION STATIONS IN THE COLONY.

The total amount of Federated Malay States revenue collected at the F.M.S. Collection Stations, Singapore, Prai, Malacca and Lumut amounted to \$1,375,914, showing an increase of \$819,819 as compared with the collections for 1922.

DISTILLERIES.

Seven distilleries were working throughout the year, viz., Parit Buntar, Taiping, Telok Anson, Kuala Lumpur, Seremban, Raub and Tanah Merah.

The total amount of samsu distilled during the year was $142,101\frac{1}{2}$ gallons compared with 146,234 gallons in 1922, a decrease of $4,132\frac{1}{2}$ gallons.

The number of illicit stills seized during the year was 274 and 222 convictions were obtained.

The revenue derived from the excise duty on locally manufactured spirits was \$581,683, an increase of \$105,474 on the amount collected in 1922.

A comparative statement of revenue derived from the samsu distilled in each State is given in appendix J, together with a comparative statement of the quantities of intoxicating liquors imported into the Federated Malay States during the last five years.

GOVERNMENT CHANDU MONOPOLY.

The factory of this department at Kuala Lumpur purchased supplies of bulk chandu from the Government Monopolies Department, Singapore, and packed the requirements of the Federated Malay States excluding the East Coast of Pahang throughout the year. The latter received its supplies of packed chandu direct from Singapore as in previous years.

The total quantity of bulk chandu purchased was 959,995 tahils and of packed chandu for the East Coast 28,356 tahils, a total increase of 88,351 tahils compared with 1922. From January to August, 1923, the cost price of bulk chandu and packed chandu was \$2.20 per tahil, but from September to end of December the price was reduced to \$1.50 per tahil for bulk chandu and \$1.60 per tahil for packed chandu.

A refund of \$148,042 was also made by the Straits Settlements Government in respect of 1922 as it was considered that the price charged was too high.

984,570 tahils of chandu were packed in the factory at Kuala Lumpur of which 959,995 tahils were purchased during the year 1923. The balance between quantity packed and the quantity purchased is accounted for by stock carried forward from previous year. The cost of packing including cost of supervision was 5.8 cents per tahil as compared with 7.2 cents in 1922.

The total sales of chandu amounted to 1,007,192 tahils, shewing an increase of 156,925 as compared with 1922.

The net profit on the year's working for the Federated Malay States was \$407,952 in excess of the previous year. The increase is accounted for by increased sales.

Five additional Government retail chandu shops were opened during the year one in Perak, two in Selangor and two in Ulu Pahang. One shop in Selangor was closed. The total number of Government shops in operation at the end of the year was 46.

The gross profit from these shops for the year amounted to \$496,228 as against \$368,986 in 1922. The working expenses amounted to \$181,894 leaving a net profit of \$314,334 or an increase of \$100,149 over 1922.

The selling price of chandu remained the same as in the previous year, viz., 37 cents per 3-hoon packet and \$3.65 per 3-chi pot. The price charged to the public was 40 cents and \$3.90 respectively.

Appendix M gives the comparative statements of monthly sales and gross receipts for each State of the Federated Malay States.

Fees obtained for licences to retailers amounted to \$87,895 as against \$74,564 in 1922.

The number of "on" licences issued during the year was 164 and "off" licences 104 as against 178 and 125 respectively in 1922.

The total quantity of chandu dross purchased by the department was 83,236.8 tahils for which \$371,532 was paid—the figure for 1922 being 80,871 tahils and \$354,504.

The number of prosecutions instituted by the department during the year was 559 and convictions obtained 506. The total fines imposed amounted to \$24,600 of which only \$13,891 was paid.

PART III.—MARINE.

The total number of vessels—exclusive of native craft—entered and cleared at the ports of the Federated Malay States was 10,096 with an aggregate tonnage of 4,605,498.

This is an increase over the previous year of 2,340 vessels and 635,140 tons.

A comparative statement of the years 1922 and 1923 is given for the four States in appendix K.

The number of native craft was 17,434 with an aggregate tonnage of 326,476. This is an increase of 4,069 vessels and 12,978 tons.

A comparative statement for native craft entered and cleared is given in appendix L.

PORT SWETTENHAM.

No vessels other than native craft were registered at this port during the year.

The number of ocean-going steamers which called at the port was 355 against 340 in 1922, an increase of 15.

The total number of merchant vessels entered was 973 with a tonnage of 1,705,908 against 999 vessels with a tonnage of 1,645,107 in the past year. Of the 973 vessels entered 934 were British with a tonnage of 1,578,216.

The total revenue collected by the Marine Department amounted to \$4,403 against \$11,055 in 1922, a decrease of \$6,652 attributable partly to the fact that the sale of stores has been transferred to Slipway suspense account.

The total expenditure was \$118,253 against \$173,012 in 1922, a decrease of \$54,759.

Lieutenant-Commander R. C. Hayes, O.B.E., R.N., continued to officiate as Harbour Master during the year.

PART IV.—EXPENDITURE.

The expenditure on the Customs Department amounted to \$681,340, of which \$396,905 was absorbed by salaries and temporary allowances, these sums being 3.41 and 2 per cent. respectively, of the Customs and Excise revenue collected.

In the Chandu Department the expenditure was \$381,818, of which \$186,481 was expended in salaries and temporary allowances.

Salaries only of the Customs and Chandu Departments came to \$583,386 or 1.91 per cent. of the total revenue whilst the total cost of these departments amounted to \$1,063,158 or 3.48 per cent. of the total revenue collected.

PART V.-LEGISLATION.

A statement shewing Enactments and Rules relating to Trade and Customs passed during the year is given in appendix N.

The new Customs and Excise Enactments came into force with effect from 1st October, 1923.

An Enactment to consolidate and amend the law imposing restriction upon the export of rubber came into force with effect from the 25th June, 1923.

PART VI.—GENERAL.

The past year has been marked by decided improvement in trade all round, due to the higher prices ruling for rubber and tin.

Rubber realised $50\frac{1}{4}$ cents a pound in the first week in January, rose to 65 cents later in the same month and at the end of December the price was $48\frac{3}{4}$ cents.

Tin rose from $\$91\frac{1}{8}$ in January to $\$109\frac{1}{2}$ in April; receded to $\$88\frac{1}{2}$ in July but rose to \$119 in the first week in December and the quotation for the last week in December was $\$117\frac{3}{4}$.

Copra prices showed a slight improvement on the 1922 figures and ranged between \$9.60 and \$12.30 as against \$9.50 and \$10.77 in 1922.

The highest price paid for sundried in Singapore was a little over \$13 in April.

In spite of the higher prices the declared exports were 104,592 pikuls less than in 1922. This may be explained possibly by shortage of labour and the diversion of the entire attention of the small holder to rubber with the advent of easy conditions and higher prices for the latter product.

Coconut palms respond more rapidly and consistently to careful husbandry than perhaps any tropical fruit yielding tree, and high or low yields depend on the attention and cultivation which these palms receive.

Very few changes occurred in the Customs Department during the year.

Major Stamford Raffles, o.B.E., Deputy Commissioner, Trade and Customs, who was acting as Superintendent of Chandu Monopoly during the absence on leave of Mr. R. F. R. Swettenham resumed duties of his substantive appointment on the latter's return from leave on 21st February, 1923.

Mr. R. C. Cussen, an officer of the Malayan Civil Service, was appointed to act for Major Stamford Raffles, o.B.E., when the latter proceeded on long leave and was acting in that capacity until 1st November, 1923, when he was succeeded by Mr. Hobbs.

Mr. J. E. Marwood, Deputy Commissioner, Trade and Customs, was granted long leave from 26th October, 1923, and Mr. J. Hobbs, Chief Superintendent, Preventive Branch, was appointed to act for him.

The writer continued to officiate as Commissioner, Trade and Customs, and Custodian of Enemy Property, Federated Malay States, throughout the year.
