SUICIDE.

11. There were no cases of suicide or of attempted suicide during the year.

HEALTH.

12. Of the total number of prisoners in the various gaols during 1923, 1,278 were treated in hospital. The deaths numbered 37 or 2.89 per cent. of the total treated against 2.05 per cent. in 1922.

DISCIPLINE OF PRISONERS.

13. The discipline generally of the prisoners was satisfactory. A total of 2,476 cases were dealt with, of which 172 cases were decided by the Visiting Justices. In 86 cases was flogging administered as compared with 37 cases of flogging in 1922.

The discipline of the Convict Establishment was satisfactory.

There was no attempt at outbreak or indication of conspiracy of any sort.

DISCIPLINE OF EUROPEAN STAFF.

14. There were 61 cases against the European Staff during the year. The majority of the cases refer to petty breaches of discipline. European Warder J. Pilborough was discharged on the termination of his three years agreement. European Warders J. H. Rice and F. G. Chaffe were dismissed from the service. European Warder H. R. C. Alford ceased work on 20th July, 1923.

DISCIPLINE OF ASIATIC STAFF.

15. The Asiatic staff consists of seven warders and 246 sub-warders. During the year 15 resigned and 22 were dismissed. There were altogether 371 cases brought of which 288 were punished, 63 cautioned, six discharged, 11 reported to Government and three sent to Court for trial.

REVENUE.

The corresponding total for 1922 was \$29,939. The revenue from the Convict Establishment shows a decrease of \$4,627 and that from other gaols a slight increase of \$131.

The Prisons Department at Taiping and Papan is now credited with the value of metal broken for the Public Works Department. The amount paid by the Public Works Department in respect of Convict Establishment, Taiping, was \$2,847 and in respect of Papan \$528.

With regard to the Convict Establishment, the Superintendent writes as follows:

INDUSTRIES.

"The number of days' work done by prisoners employed on stone-breaking was 41,212 as against 50,701 in 1922, and $6,579\frac{1}{2}$ cubic yards of metal were prepared for the Public Works Department. This is accounted for by the decrease in the number of admissions both of short-sentence and long-sentence prisoners.

Prisoners on gaol services, which include dhobies, cooks, sweepers, lampmen, night-soil gang, orderlies in hospital, store and office, whitewashers, gardeners, cleaning arms, photographers, water-carriers, bakers, masons and painters, did 43,693 days' work as against 39,406 in 1922. The garden produced 81.69 pikuls of vegetables valued at \$245, which were used for prisoners' food. In the labour yard 73,106 days' work were done as against 73,685 in 1922 in the following departments: carpentering, carpet-making, book-binding, printing, weaving, tailoring, blacksmiths, tinsmith, coir work, rattan work, chick-making and boot-making.

The total value of the output, which includes articles sold, articles made on gaol account and articles sent to the showroom to be kept for future sale, was \$26,982 as compared with \$47,359 in 1922. The decrease is due mainly to lack of orders from customers."

EXPENDITURE.

17. The total expenditure in the Federated Malay States Gaols amounted to \$425,881. A daily average of 1,384 prisoners was maintained at a nett cost of \$400,438 giving cost per head of \$289 as compared with \$282 in 1922. The reason for the annual increase of \$7 over nett cost per prisoner in 1923 is that the decrease in the daily average does not and cannot result in a proportionate decrease in the cost of maintenance.

GENERAL.

18. Five European Warders were engaged locally, one on 12 months probation and four on six months probation. European Warder J. Curry resigned the service at the end of the year. European Warder H. C. Ridsdale was seconded for service as Sergeant Major Instructor, M.V.I., from 1st September, 1923. Messrs. R. Hunter, C. Bailey and G. Williams were promoted Senior Gaoler, Junior Gaoler and Chief Warder, respectively. European Warders H. Morris, J. Larkworthy, J. J. Clark, C. H. Clarke, A. Williamson and C. H. Cox were placed on the pensionable establishment on termination of their agreement. Acting Chief Warder W. H. G. Mordey died in Kuala Lumpur European Hospital on 23rd July, 1923. Senior Gaoler R. S. Pharoah retired on pension on 26th March, 1923.

Mr. P. T. Allen officiated as Inspector of Prisons from 1st January to 28th February; Mr. F. A. S. McClelland from 1st March to 19th April; Mr. C. W. Harrison from 20th April to 31st August and the writer of this report from 1st September to the end of the year.

Taiping Prison was inspected on 5th and 6th March, 1923.

Batu Gajah Prison was inspected on 1st March and 13th November, 1923.

Papan Prison was inspected on 25th January, 2nd March and 14th November, 1923.

Kuala Lumpur Prison was inspected on 21st November, 1923.

Seremban Prison was inspected on 22nd November, 1923.

Bentong Prison was inspected on 23rd November, 1923.

Kuala Lipis Prison was inspected on 24th November, 1923.

Kuantan Prison was inspected on 27th November, 1923.

Raub Prison was inspected on 28th November, 1923.
