The motion is agreed to.

“That this Council approves of special votes of \$33,494.74 and \$25,301.33 to meet the payment for 1921 and 1922 respectively to European Masters and Mistresses of the higher rates of salary resulting from the recommendations of the Anomalies Committee.”

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL addresses the Council and, seconded by Captain CHANCELLOR, moves that the Native States Prisoners (Amendment) Bill be read a third time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a third time and passed.

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL addresses the Council and, seconded by Mr. SAUNDERS, moves that the Decorations and Uniforms, etc., Unauthorised Use Bill be read a third time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a third time and passed.

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL addresses the Council and, seconded by Mr. BEATTY, moves that the Aliens Restriction Bill be read a third time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a third time and passed.

The TREASURER addresses the Council and, seconded by Captain CHANCELLOR, moves the first reading of a Bill to amend Ordinance No. 103 (Stamps).

The Bill is read a first time.

The TREASURER gives notice that he will move the second reading of the Bill at the next meeting of Council.

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL addresses the Council and, seconded by Mr. BEATTY, moves the first reading of a Bill "To incorporate a Financial Committee and an Executive Committee of Raffles College and to regulate their procedure."

The Bill is read a first time, and the ATTORNEY-GENERAL gives notice that he will move its second reading at the next meeting of Council.

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL, seconded by Mr. SAUNDERS, moves that the Merchant Shipping (Amendment) Bill be read a second time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a second time.

On the motion of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, Council goes into Committee on the Bill.

A new Clause 2 to read as follows is inserted and passed:—

"2. Sub-section (2) of section 417 of Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping) hereinafter called the principal Ordinance is amended by deleting the words after the words "on Sunday" and substituting therefor the words "unless the Master or Agent of the ship obtains from the Master Attendant in Singapore or from the Resident Councillor in Penang or Malacca or from the Resident in Labuan an exemption in writing which shall be granted on payment of the fee prescribed in sub-section (3)."

Clause 2 re-numbered 3 is passed without further amendment.

Clause 1 is amended to read "Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping) Amendment Ordinance, 1922", instead of "Merchant Shipping Amendment Ordinance, 1922."

Council resumes. The ATTORNEY-GENERAL reports that the Bill has been considered in Committee and passed with certain amendments and gives notice that he will move its third reading at the next meeting of Council.



The ATTORNEY-GENERAL, seconded by Mr. BEATTY, moves that the Agricultural Pests (Amendment) Bill be read a second time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a second time.

On the motion of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, Council goes into Committee on the Bill.

Clause 2 is passed without amendment.

Clause 3 is amended by inserting the words "of the principal Ordinance" after the words "section 5 (1)" in the third line and is passed as amended.

Clause 4 is passed without amendment.

Clause 5 is considered and it is decided to obtain further information from the Federated Malay States Government concerning its provisions.

The Bill is left in Committee.

The ATTORNEY-GENERAL, seconded by Mr. SAUNDERS, moves that the Rubber Lands Assessment Bill be read a second time.

Mr. MITCHELL addresses the Council.

Mr. CAMPBELL addresses the Council.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a second time.

On the motion of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, the Bill is referred to a Select Committee consisting of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, Mr. WOLFERSTAN, Mr. MITCHELL, Mr. CAMPBELL, Mr. THORNE and the Collector of Land Revenue, Singapore (Mr. LORNIE).

On the motion of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL, Council goes into Committee on the Premiums (Leases) Bill.

On the motion of the ATTORNEY-GENERAL the amendments recommended by the Select Committee in their report dated the 31st January, 1922, being Council Paper No. 8 of 1922, are passed *en bloc*. The Clauses and Schedule of the Bill are passed without further amendment.

Council resumes. The ATTORNEY-GENERAL, reports that the Bill has been considered in Committee and passed with certain amendments and moves, seconded by Mr. BEATTY, that it be read a third time.

The motion is agreed to, and the Bill is read a third time and passed.

On the motion of the COLONIAL SECRETARY, Council adjourns until Monday, the 27th March.

#### A BILL

#### intituled

AN Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 44 (Bankruptcy).

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Straits Settlements with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short title. **1.** This Ordinance may be cited as Ordinance No. 44 (Bankruptcy) Amendment Ordinance, 1922.

Amendment of section 39 of Ordinance No. 44 (Bankruptcy). **2.** Section 39 of Ordinance No. 44 (Bankruptcy) shall be numbered (1) and the following sub-sections are added thereto—

(2) The Registrar in each Settlement shall keep for each Settlement a separate list of all Receiving Orders and Adjudication Orders made in each Settlement; and on such list every such Order shall be forthwith entered under the headings of the letters of the Alphabet and every Order rescinding or annulling any such order shall be noted in any such list against the order rescinded or annulled.

**3.** Sub-section (2) shall not apply to Labuan.

#### OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to provide a ready means of information to intending purchasers and mortgagees of the existence of a defect in the title of the property concerned.

The reason of the Bill is that such information is not to be obtained from a search in the Registry of Deeds and is not otherwise easily available.

# A BILL

## *intituled*

AN Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 39 (Malacca Lands Customary Rights).

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Straits Settlements with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as Ordinance No. 39 (Malacca Lands Customary Rights) Amendment Ordinance, 1922.

2. The following section is added after section 8 of Ordinance No. 39 (Malacca Lands Customary Rights).

8A.—(1) The Governor in Council may, upon the report of the Resident Councillor, by provisional order declare that any customary land has for three consecutive years prior to the date of such provisional order not been used mainly or substantially for the planting of padi or other agricultural purposes but has been used mainly or substantially for building purposes and that the said land is no longer held under customary tenure.

(2) Such provisional order shall be registered by the Collector of Land Revenue in the register required to be kept by section 13 and a copy thereof shall be served upon the person (if any) in occupation of the land and also in some conspicuous place upon the land.

(3) Any person claiming that any right to or interest in such land has been or may be injuriously affected by such provisional order may within three months after the registration thereof apply by motion to a Judge of the Supreme Court for a declaration that such land has for three consecutive years prior to the date of such order been used



mainly or substantially for the planting of padi or other agricultural purposes and has not been used mainly or substantially for building purposes.

(4) If the Judge, from whose decision there shall be no appeal, shall decide that the land has during the period in question been used mainly or substantially for the planting of padi or other agricultural purposes and has not been mainly or substantially used for building purposes, the Governor in Council shall set aside the provisional order and the Collector of Land Revenue shall delete it from the Register.

(5) If no person applies by motion as mentioned in subsection (3) within three months of the registration of the provisional order or if the Judge decides that the land has during the period in question been used mainly or substantially for building purposes and has not been used mainly or substantially for the planting of padi or other agricultural purposes, the Governor in Council shall confirm the provisional order and thereupon such confirming order shall be registered by the Collector of Land Revenue in the register required to be kept by Section 13 and such confirming order shall be binding and conclusive against all parties and shall not be called in question in any Court of law.

(6) Whenever a confirming order of the Governor in Council has been registered as aforesaid the provisions of this Ordinance shall no longer apply to such land and the person against whom the confirming order has been registered under subsection (5) of this section shall deliver to the Collector of Land Revenue all documents of title in his possession relating to such land and shall receive in exchange therefor a Statutory Land Grant under the provisions of Ordinance No. 34 (Crown Lands) on such terms and conditions as the Governor thinks fit.

(7) If the person against whom a confirming order of the Governor in Council has been registered as aforesaid neglects or fails within one month thereafter to deliver to the Collector of Land Revenue all documents of title in his possession relating to such land the Collector of Land Revenue shall enter upon the land and the same shall be deemed to have been forfeited and vested in the Crown free from all rights, encumbrances, claims and demands whether claimed by the person against whom the said order has been registered as aforesaid or by any other person claiming by, through, under or in trust for him.

#### OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to empower the Governor in Council to make an order that land held by customary tenure under the Ordinance has ceased to be so held, upon the ground that for the previous three years it has been used, not for agricultural, but for building purposes. When such an order is made and documents of title are delivered the owner will receive a Statutory Grant as title to his land. If the documents are not delivered the land will be forfeited.

The reason for the Bill is that certain lands near Malacca now held by customary tenure are being used for building and not for agricultural purposes.

## A BILL

*intituled*

AN Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal).

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Straits Settlements with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal) Amendment No. Ordinance. Short title.

2. The following clause is added to section 116 (1) of Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal) hereinafter called the principal Ordinance— Amendment of section 116 (1) of the principal Ordinance.

“or (d) causes or allows any carriage, cart or vehicle for the conveyance of persons or of goods or other articles, whether with or without horses or cattle to rest in any public road, except in such places as are appointed for that purpose under any law in force for the time being, for a longer time than is absolutely necessary to take up or set down any persons, or to load or unload any goods or other articles, or to collect hire shall be guilty of causing an obstruction, and”

3. Sub-section (3) of section 116 of the principal Ordinance is deleted and the following is substituted therefor— Amendment of section 116 (3) of the principal Ordinance.

“(3) The Commissioners may cause any such obstruction to be removed or may themselves through their servants remove the same to a suitable place, there to remain at the risk of the owner and person offending, and may detain the same until the expenses of removal and detention are paid provided that such power of removal shall be exercised only in regard to such streets as the Commissioners shall by resolution have prescribed and in the personal presence of such officers as the Commissioners shall have nominated by resolution confirmed by the Governor in Council; provided also that the expense of removal shall not exceed \$4 per wagon trip and that the expense of detention shall be at the rate of \$1 per diem; provided further that if at the expiration of 7 days from the date of removal the expenses of removal and detention shall not have been paid, the matter that has been removed shall if it is not of the apparent value of \$25 or over become the property of the Commissioners, and if it is of the apparent value of over \$25 be sold by public auction and the proceeds thereof less expenses shall be held by the Commissioners and paid to the owner of the matter removed but if such proceeds are not claimed within one month of the sale as aforesaid they shall become the property of the Commissioners”.

Power to remove obstructions.

## OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The object of this Bill is to give the Municipal Commissioners power to prosecute in the case of vehicles loitering or being left in public places, and to take charge of such vehicles and dispose of them if they are not claimed within a reasonable time.

The words of the first amendment repeat the words of section 14 (n) Ordinance No. 96 (Minor Offences) but under that Ordinance prosecutions are conducted by the Police only.

## A BILL

AN Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 41 (Pensions).

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Straits Settlements with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

Short title.

1. This Ordinance may be cited as Ordinance No. 41 (Pensions) Amendment Ordinance, 1922.

Amendment  
of section 2  
of Ordinance  
No. 41 (Pen-  
sions.)

2. Section 2 of Ordinance No. 41 (Pensions), hereinafter called the principal Ordinance, is amended by the addition of the following words thereto:—

“Provided that the total pension of an officer who first entered the Public Service of the Colony (otherwise than by transfer from the United Kingdom or another Colony or a Protectorate) after the 25th day of August, 1902, shall not exceed £1,300.”

Amendment

Ordinance.

3. Section 6 of the principal Ordinance is amended by the addition of the following words thereto:—

“And does not exceed £1,300: “Provided that the limit of £1,300 shall not apply to any officer who entered the public service of the United Kingdom or of a Colony or of a Protectorate before the 25th August, 1902.”

## OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Secretary of State has approved the raising of the maximum of the amount of pension which can ordinarily be drawn by an officer of the Colony from £1,000 to £1,300.

The new limit of £1,300 applies to all officers who entered the Government service on first appointment in Malaya after the 25th August, 1902. But it does not apply to those who, having entered the Government service at home or in some other Colony before that date, have been or are subsequently transferred to the Straits Settlements.

A BILL  
*intituled*

AN Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping).

It is hereby enacted by the Governor of the Straits Settlements with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof as follows:—

1. This Ordinance may be cited as Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping) (Amendment No. 2) Ordinance, 1922. Short title.

2. Section 11 of Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping), hereinafter referred to as “the principal Ordinance”, is amended by adding the following subsections after subsection (2) thereof:— Amendment of section 11 of the principal Ordinance.

(2A) The Governor may appoint a Deputy Surveyor-General of Ships either generally for all the purposes of this Ordinance and of the rules made under it or for the purpose of particular parts, sections or rules.

(2B) Any act done by, to, or before a Deputy Surveyor-General of Ships within the powers conferred upon him shall have the same effect as if done by, to, or before the Surveyor-General of Ships.

3.—(1) Section 15 (1) subsections (b), (c), (d) and (e), section 19, subsections (1) and (4), section 394 and Schedule B of the principal Ordinance are amended by substituting the words “seventy-five tons” for the words “fifty tons” and the words “one hundred and twenty-five tons” for the words “one hundred tons” wherever the said words “fifty tons” or “one hundred tons” respectively occur therein. Amendment of sections 15, 19, 285 and 394, and Schedule B of the principal Ordinance.

(2) Section 285 of the principal Ordinance is amended by substituting for the words “Master of a local-trade ship under fifty tons” the words “Master of a local-trade ship under seventy-five tons”.

(3) A Master having a certificate issued at a date before the date of the coming into force of this Ordinance as Master of a local-trade ship under fifty tons shall be deemed to be a Master having a certificate as Master of a local-trade ship under seventy-five tons for all the purposes of the principal Ordinance as amended by this Ordinance.

### OBJECTS AND REASONS.

This Bill makes two amendments.

The first concerns the post of Deputy Surveyor-General of Ships which has been recently created. Ordinance No. 125 (Merchant Shipping) does not at present provide for the appointment to the office and the duties attaching to it. The object of the Bill (section 2) is to enact the required provisions.

The second amendment (section 3) enables the masters and engineers of British local-trade ships of between twenty-five and one hundred and twenty-five tons to control slightly larger ships with their present certificates. The object of this amendment is to encourage the construction of larger ships and to allow of the carriage of more cargo.

**CHOLERA.**—Information having been received that a dangerous infectious or contagious disease, namely, cholera, exists in an epidemic state at Bassein, it is hereby declared by His Excellency the Governor, in exercise of the powers conferred by section 48 of Ordinance No. 157 (Quarantine and Prevention of Disease), that the port of Bassein is an infected place for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

**No. 570.**—ORDINANCE NO. 157 (QUARANTINE AND PREVENTION OF DISEASE).

**WHEREAS** it appears that Rinderpest exists among cattle in the Settlement of Malacca, the Resident Councillor, Malacca, by virtue of the powers conferred by Rule 42 of the Quarantine Rules, 1915, which were delegated to him by Notification No. 201, published in the *Gazette* of the 18th February, 1916, prohibits the removal of any cattle from the area described in the annexed schedule and orders that no cattle be moved about or allowed to stray within the said area except cattle moved under the supervision or direction of an Officer of the Veterinary Department.

**SCHEDULE.**

A radius of 2 miles from the 18½ milestone at Sungei Baru Hulu.

**Note.**—This order does not apply to draught cattle in carts coming from places outside, and passing along any main road which runs through the said area to places beyond, provided that such cattle do not stop within the infected area.

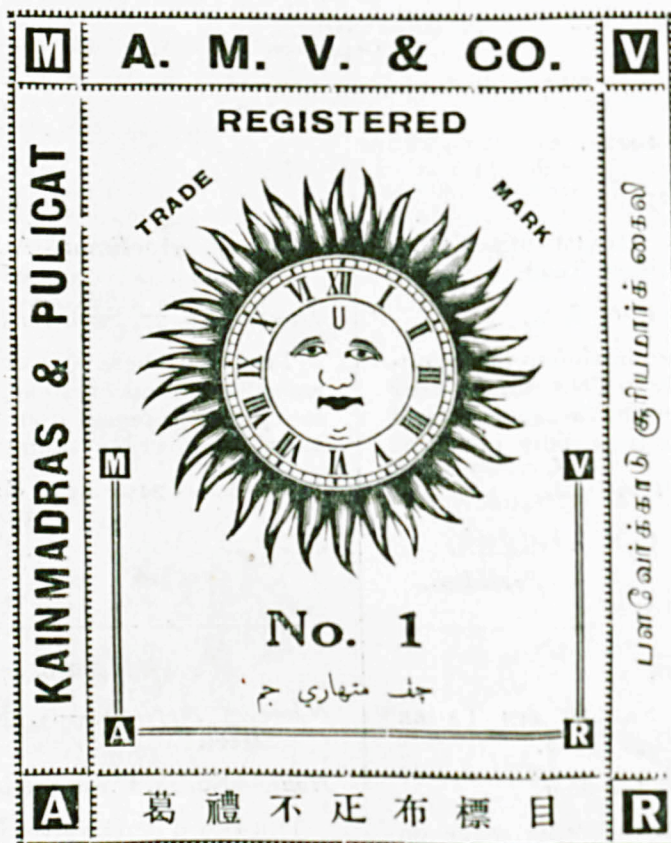

**HARBOUR REGULATIONS.**

1. DURING the period of the visit of His Royal Highness THE PRINCE OF WALES in H.M.S. *Renown*—i.e., from 6 A.M. March 31st to A.M. April 2nd—Masters of all vessels are directed not to anchor in the Inner Harbour in such a position so that any part of the vessel, when swinging to any state of the tide, is within a channel one cable wide, taking a line from the North end of the Breakwater to the centre of Johnston's Pier to be the centre of the channel.

2. Launches and small craft must not anchor or lay within 50 fathoms of Johnston's Pier during the above period.

3. On the Official Landing of His Royal Highness, i.e. between 9-30 A.M. and 10-15 A.M. on the 31st March, craft of all descriptions are requested to keep clear of this channel.

4. Craft of all descriptions are requested to give immediate effect to any orders given them by the Marine Department Launches or by launches flying a white flag with "Police" in red letters.

5. Vessels anchoring in the Outer Roads are directed to keep well clear of Man-of-War Anchorage during the stay of H.M.S. *Renown*.

**No. 372.—ORDINANCE NO. 135 (MUNICIPAL).**

To the occupiers of premises within Conservancy District No. 8 bounded by:—

South Bridge Road, Spring Street, Banda Street, Sago Lane, Sago Street, New Bridge Road, and Boat Quay.

Notice is hereby given that in exercise of the powers vested in the Municipal Commissioners by section 222 of Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal), and with the approval of the Governor in Council, a compulsory system of night-soil removal, by which the soiled pail and its contents will be removed from each latrine, will be applied to that area on and after the first day of May, 1922.\*

And that in exercise of the powers vested in them by section 223 (2) & (3) of Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal), and with the approval of the Governor in Council, the following fees will be charged for removal of night-soil and the cleansing of latrine:—

For removal every day, if recommended by the Health Officer, \$4 per latrine per mensem payable quarterly in advance.

For removal every alternate day \$2 per latrine per mensem, payable quarterly in advance.

And that in exercise of the powers vested in them by section 223 (1) of Ordinance No. 135 (Municipal), and with the approval of the Governor in Council, the following regulations have been approved for the purpose of removal of night-soil:—

1. Every latrine shall be provided with its own pail, which shall be of Standard Municipal pattern.
  - (a) The walls, up to the seat and base of the compartment holding the pail, shall be plastered with cement or other impervious material.
  - (b) The base of every latrine shall be not less than 3 inches above the adjoining floor level, and shall be laid so as to fall towards and into a proper drain, which must be constructed if not already provided. Granite slabs shall be laid to support the pail.
  - (c) No latrine shall be of what is known as the "drop" class, that is, communicating directly by means of a shaft or tube with a latrine below.
  - (d) The doors and walls of all latrines shall be so constructed as to permit of ample circulation of air.
  - (e) The pail must be so placed that its top shall be not more than one inch below the underside of the urine guard. The hole in the seat shall be not more than 9 inches wide or 1 foot 2 inches long and the base shall be arranged so as to guide the pail into its proper place.
  - (f) Every latrine shall be provided with proper iron pail doors of sufficient size, hanging from the top or side, with a clear space of one inch at the bottom.
  - (g) Every latrine shall be constructed in accordance with the Municipal design.

2. The coolies and overseers of the Commissioners shall be allowed free access daily, between the hours of 6 A. M. and 10 A. M., to every latrine within the area aforesaid, for the purpose of removing night-soil.

3. The Commissioners will at their expense provide pails to facilitate removal, also pails in place of those worn out, or broken, otherwise than through neglect or misuse by the occupier of the house or his servants.

4. The occupier of every house within the aforesaid area shall take steps to ensure the safe custody, preservation, and proper use of all latrine pails used in his house or compound, and in the event of loss he will be charged the cost of replacement.

**No. 513.—ORDINANCE NO. 96 (MINOR OFFENCES).****Police Orders framed under Section 6 (4) of Ordinance 96 (Minor Offences) for the Regulation of Traffic on the occasion of the arrival of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales at Singapore on 31st March, 1922.**

1. After 9-30 A.M. all pedestrian traffic shall keep in rear of the police on duty on the line of route, till after the passage of the procession of Their Highnesses the Malay Rulers to Government House.

2. After 9-15 A.M. all traffic, vehicular or otherwise, except the cars of Their Highnesses the Rulers of the Unfederated Malay States which will be distinguished by a yellow plate fixed on the bonnet, and cars provided with special passes issued by the Inspector-General of Police, will be stopped along the line of route, and all other vehicles will be diverted into the nearest street. All cross traffic or debouching traffic on to the route will be stopped at the same hour 100 yards short of the line of route and will not be resumed till permitted by the police officer on duty.

3. Cars of the Malay Rulers or those provided with the special pass mentioned in paragraph 2 may be permitted to pass up to 9-40 A.M. but not later.

4. Cars bringing spectators to the Reception Pavilion Stand having set down their passengers will cross Cavenagh Bridge (all traffic northwards on which will be closed at 8-45 A.M. till reopened by the police on duty) and be parked in Raffles Place and adjacent streets. A space will however be left in rear of the Stand and to the South of the Theatre in which the cars of the Malay Rulers and their followers will be arranged ready to proceed in procession to Government House, also in rear of them those cars provided with police passes.

5. Cars bringing spectators to the Municipal Compound Stand will proceed after setting down their occupants *via* High Street, Hill Street, and be parked in Coleman Street, facing South-east.

6. Cars bringing spectators to the Cathedral Corner Stand after setting down their occupants will proceed over Stamford Bridge into Beach Road where they will be parked.

7. Cars proceeding to the Stand at the War Memorial will proceed over Anderson Bridge and be parked in Finlayson Green till called for.

8. Cars proceeding to the Straits Chinese Stand after setting down their occupants will proceed to Raffles Quay where they will be parked.

9. Cars bringing spectators to the Scots' Church Stand will drop their passengers in Penang Lane where they will be parked.

10. Cars proceeding to the Chinese Chamber of Commerce Stand and the Eurasian Stand will approach by Stamford Road and having set down their occupants will proceed by way of High Street, and Hill Street to Coleman Street where they will be parked.

11. The route of the procession will be kept clear till after the passage of the procession of the Malay Sultans to Government House for traffic proceeding towards Tanglin.

12. The line of route of the Procession is Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, High Street, St. Andrew's Road, Stamford Road, Connaught Drive, St. Andrew's Road, Stamford Road, Old Gaol Site (Children's Corner), Orchard Road and Edinburgh Road.

13. All traffic stopped on roads adjacent to the route must remain drawn up on the left side of the road facing in the direction in which it was proceeding. The right side must be left clear of vehicles so as to avoid a block on the resumption of traffic.



14. The public shall be kept clear of the enclosure reserved to the north of Anderson Bridge on Connaught Drive by the sea for the saluting battery to be stationed there.

15. The general public must remain in rear of a line drawn from the South-east corner of the Treasury Porch to kerb opposite in Empress Place, along the kerb to Anderson Bridge the whole of which will be kept clear of the public, along the Northern kerb of the approach to Anderson Bridge to Connaught Drive. In rear of a line drawn from the west side of Connaught Drive to the Eastern Island and thence to the Cricket Club.

**Police Orders framed under Section 6 (4) of Ordinance 96 (Minor Offences) for the Regulation of Traffic at Queen Street, and Waterloo Street, Singapore, and the streets in the vicinity on the occasion of the encampment of the Burma Rifles and of the School Children assembling to greet His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales on Friday, 31st March, 1922.**

1. Waterloo Street and Queen Street will be closed to all traffic between Bras Basah and Stamford Roads from 6 A.M., 30th March, to 6 A.M., 2nd April.

2. Motors conveying children to Raffles Reclamation must have crossed the line of route of the Royal Procession before 9-30 A.M.

3. On arrival at the Reclamation (Entrance near Raffles Hotel) the motors conveying them shall be directed to proceed to Waterloo and Bencoolen Streets, North of Bras Basah Road, where they will be parked facing towards North-east till required.

4. The police on duty will assist in keeping a clear passage to the motors after the ceremony, to which the children will proceed on foot.

5. Children walking in procession from the Anglo-Chinese School, St. Andrew's School, St. Joseph's Institution, etc., will be permitted to cross the line of route after 9-30 A.M. and the police will facilitate their passage.

6. Cars bringing children from the Garrison and other schools to the Ladies' Lawn will be parked in Dhoby Ghaut, they must be at the Ladies' Lawn by 9-30 A.M.

7. Trams bringing children from Gaylang will stop at the junction of Prinsep Street and Selegie Road, and having set down their occupants will proceed empty down Bras Basah Road and resume running.

8. Wheeled traffic other than trams and that containing children, or empty cars proceeding from the Reclamation to park in Bencoolen Street and Waterloo Street, will be stopped along Bras Basah Road from 9-30 A.M. till the children have left.

9. Beach Road 100 yards on either side of the Reclamation entrance will be kept clear of traffic from 9-30 A.M. till after the departure of the children in order to facilitate the arrival and departure of the motor traffic conveying them.

10. No person except the children and the officials in charge of them will be permitted to cross the rails on to the Reclamation.

**Police Orders framed under Section 6 (4) of Ordinance 96 (Minor Offences) for the Regulation of Traffic during the holding of Malaya-Borneo Exhibition at Singapore, March-April, 1922.**

1. Passengers desiring to alight from their vehicles at the Telok Ayer (North) Entrance will approach by Raffles Quay and after setting down their passengers these vehicles will be parked on the vacant ground between Raffles Quay and the sea. When picking up their passengers these vehicles will do so at the Telok Ayer Exit (North) and will leave by Japan Street and Robinson Road.

2. Vehicles whose passengers desire to alight at the Main Entrance in Robinson Road will if coming from the direction of Town, set down their passengers at the main entrance and proceed along Robinson Road. They will be parked in Robinson Road, Telok Ayer Street and Cecil Street. When returning to pick up their passengers they will do so along Robinson Road from the direction of Anson Road taking up their passengers at the Mount Palmer Exit (South) or at the main entrance as directed.

3. Vehicles whose passengers desire to alight at the Main Entrance in Robinson Road will if coming from the direction of Anson Road set down their passengers at the main entrance and turning up McCallum Street will re-enter Robinson Road *via* Cecil Street and Japan Street. They will be parked along Robinson Road between McCallum Street and Japan Street. They will pick up their passengers at the main entrance and leave Robinson Road towards Anson Road.

4. 'Rikishas will not be permitted to park in Robinson Road.

5. The piece of ground to the Town side of the Detective Station is reserved for the use of the Singapore Automobile Club.

Cars bearing the badge of the Club will after setting down their passengers enter this enclosure from Cecil Street. When leaving this enclosure they will leave by Robinson Road.

6. Vehicles bearing a Patron's badge will be permitted to enter the Exhibition Grounds by Gate No. 4 (James Walk) after setting down their passengers at one or other of the entrances. They will be parked on the road south of the Union Jack Club and will pick up their passengers there.

7. On the occasion of the visit of His Royal Highness the PRINCE OF WALES, all vehicular traffic will be diverted along Cecil Street, at the Finlayson Green and Anson Road ends of Robinson Road, and no vehicular traffic will be permitted to enter Robinson Road from side streets from 2-30 P.M. till His Royal Highness has entered the Exhibition when traffic may be again resumed.

8. Robinson Road will be again closed as above to vehicular traffic at 4-30 P.M. and kept closed till after the passage of His Royal Highness on his way to the Polo Club.

9. On the occasion of His Royal Highness' visit, the cars of Their Highnesses the Malay Rulers will enter the Exhibition Grounds by Gate No. 4, and proceed as far as Northcliffe Avenue when the Rulers alight and proceed on foot to the Grand Stand.

10. Their cars will be parked in James Walk, till after the departure of His Royal Highness.

**Police Orders framed under Section 6 (4) of Ordinance 96 (Minor Offences) for the Regulation of Traffic at the Polo Ground, Balestier Road. Singapore, on the occasion of the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, on 31st March, 1922.**

1. At 4 p.m. Balestier Road will be closed to all traffic, except cars proceeding to the Polo Ground. These will be distinguished by a red and black ticket on the wind-screen which will be issued to ticket holders by the Polo Club. Traffic coming along Moulmein Road except the cars forming the Royal Procession will be diverted along Rangoon Road. Traffic coming east along Balestier Road from Thomson Road shall be stopped 100 yards short of its junction with Moulmein Road.
2. MacNair Road will be closed to all traffic except to members and their friends proceeding to the Polo Ground.
3. All cars proceeding to the Polo Ground except those in the Royal Procession will approach from the South or Serangoon Road end of Balestier Road and set down their occupants, non-members, at the South Gate; members and their friends at the North Gate. This must be completed by 4.45 p.m. after which hour no car will be permitted to enter Balestier Road till after the arrival of His Royal Highness.
4. Cars having set down their occupants will proceed on the left hand side of the road up Balestier Road, Moulmein Road, down Rangoon Road, and turn to the left in Serangoon Road. They will be parked back along the left of these roads in single file, the head car of the file being in Serangoon Road just round the corner from Balestier Road.
5. No car may move into Balestier Road from the Rank until the Royal car has left on return to Government House.
6. The Royal cars having set down their occupants at the North Gate will proceed into Serangoon Road, turn and be parked on the right hand side of Balestier Road, with the Royal car just short of the North Gate. 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1. All vehicles other than jinrikishas will approach the course by the bridge at the junction of Kampong Java and Buffalo Roads from Kampong Java Road and Bukit Timah Road, and except vehicles containing soldiers or sailors in uniform which will proceed down Buffalo Road to the entrance provided for them just beyond the Golf Club House, will proceed to the Public Stand entrance, and having set down their passengers will leave the Club grounds by the new road, and having crossed the bridge at the end of Buffalo Road will turn to the right along Kampong Java Road and be parked by the Police in New Cemetery Road, Kampong Java Road and Tomson Road till required after the departure of the Royal party.

3. No vehicle after 2 P.M. will be permitted to pass up Buffalo Road from Serangoon Road beyond the junction of Buffalo and Race Course Roads.

4. Vehicles conveying soldiers and sailors will be parked in Buffalo Road, and will leave after the Meeting by Serangoon Road.



5. Passengers arriving by 'rikisha will alight in Kampong Java Road at the bridge crossing the canal opposite the Grand Stand entrance and will proceed up Kampong Java Road towards Thomson Road when they will be parked by the Police on duty.

6. All traffic in Bukit Timah Road between its junction with Kampong Java Road and Cavenagh Road will be stopped at 2-45 P.M. till after the passage of the Royal cars when it may be resumed, till it is again stopped previous to the departure of the Royal Party.

7. At 2-50 P.M. all entry to the Race Course will be closed till after the arrival of the Royal Procession.

8. Similarly all entry or exit of other traffic to the Course will be suspended five minutes before the departure of the Royal Party, and till after the departure of Their Highnesses the Malay Rulers which will take place immediately after.

**Police Orders framed under Section 6 (4) of Ordinance 96 (Minor Offences) for the Regulation of Traffic on the occasion of the Torch-light Procession in Honour of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales at Singapore, on 1st April, 1922.**

1. Those taking part in the procession will assemble at four different points from whence they will proceed to Raffles Reclamation there to be formed up.

2. The Assembly points are (a) Tunku Ibrahim's house at Sultan Gate, (b) Teluk Ayer Street, (c) Philip Street, (d) People's Park.

3. At 7 P.M. police on duty at these four points will assist in keeping sufficient space clear for those taking part in the procession to enable them to form up, and when they move off will proceed each procession to clear the way.

4. When ready to proceed those assembling at Tunku Ibrahim's house will move *viâ* Sultan Gate and Beach Road to their Assembly point at Raffles Reclamation.

5. Those assembling at Phillip Street will move off at 8 P.M. sharp *viâ* Chulia Street, Battery Road, Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, Connaught Drive, Stamford Bridge to their Assembly point on the Reclamation.

6. Those assembling at Teluk Ayer Street will move off at 8-20 P.M. *viâ* Japan Street, Raffles Quay, Collyer Quay, Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, Connaught Drive, Stamford Bridge to their Assembly point on the Reclamation.

7. Those assembling at People's park will proceed at 8-40 P.M. *viâ* Upper Cross Street, Cross Street, Raffles Quay, Collyer Quay, Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, Connaught Drive, Stamford Bridge to their Assembly point at Raffles Reclamation.

8. At 8-30 P.M. Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, Connaught Drive, St Andrew's Road, Stamford Road from Connaught Drive to North Bridge Road, Beach Road from Stamford Bridge to Middle Road, will be closed to all vehicular traffic except those occupied by officials concerned with the procession.

9. Beach Road from Stamford Bridge to Middle Road, the Reclamation, and Raffles Institute grounds will be cleared of all persons at 8-45 P.M. except those taking part in the procession till the procession has left.



10. At 9-45 P.M. the Police will keep a clear route for the procession over Stamford Bridge along Connaught Drive round the North-east Island, past the Reception Pavilion Stand and over Anderson Bridge. Also along Stamford Road to Connaught Drive and to the Town Hall for the passage of the Royal Procession.

11. On reaching Johnston's Pier, the Malay part of the procession will proceed along Collyer Quay till its rear has passed the pier when it will halt.

12. The Chinese part of the procession preceded by a body of Police will proceed by Battery Road, Chulia Street, North Canal Road, New Bridge Road, Hill Street, High Street, St. Andrew's Road, and Hill Street when the procession will disperse.

13. When the Chinese part of the procession has cleared Johnston's Pier, the Malay portion will return from Collyer Quay *via* Fullerton Road, Anderson Bridge, Connaught Drive, Stamford Bridge, to the Reclamation.

14. When it has arrived at the Reclamation the Police will be withdrawn from Beach Road, and Connaught Drive, and transferred to St. Andrew's Road and Stamford Road which roads will be kept clear for the return of the Chinese procession.
